

This term, the secondary school classes are working on their writing skills and their reading comprehension through novel studies. Each lesson, the classes are reading a chapter or two of their class novel and then using the text to study different sentence structures. They are then applying this to their own writing.

The Year 7 class has begun reading Harry Potter and the Philosopher's Stone and have decided that learning magic at school is much better than learning Maths and English. They are identifying how different sentences from the book are made up from different word groups and how that impacts our understanding of the text.

The Year 8s are reading Holes and are very grateful that we don't make them dig all day at school. They are learning about the importance of structuring a sentence correctly so that they can get meaning across effectively.


The Year 9/10 class is reading Tomorrow When the War Began and are engaging in conversations about what their lives would look like if they suddenly found themselves in a war. They are also using reading comprehension skills to fill in missing blanks to make complete sentences.



In the Senior English class, the students are working towards completing their Stage 1 Essential English. They are both analysing texts and creating their own texts, using their knowledge of text structure to create texts for a variety of audiences and purposes.

Malpa Young Doctors

In Semester 1 2024, the Malpa students at Kaurna Plains School engaged in learning that focused on Six Key Themes of Environmental Health, Nutrition, Health Literacy, Hygiene, Leadership and Wellbeing. Our Young Doctors took pride in learning about their culture, language, health, wellbeing and keeping our environment healthy.

Activities about environment health and caring for country exposed our Young Doctors to think more about ways in which our environment needs to be cared for. This was mostly directed at our school, classroom and home environments. This then led to ways in which we, as a group, could extend this into caring for and taking pride in our community. We looked at traditional ways of caring for country and



how we, as Aboriginal people, can implement some of these ideas into our school environment.

The nutrition, health, literacy and hygiene concepts gave students a better understanding of how we can make better choices when selecting healthy and nutritional foods and drinks. This was interlinked with hygiene and wellbeing to ensure we are taking better care of our bodies holistically. The Young Doctors were given the opportunity to create healthy snacks and drinks and to share these with other students and staff members.



In Week 5 we had our graduation, presenting students with their certificates. Congratulations to those who graduated.

STEM with Aunty Jyoti

This has been a busy time in STEM room. Since Term 1, our YASTA group has been preparing for the STEM congress. STEM congress is an opportunity where we get to learn about various STEM advancements and how Aboriginal culture included STEM into daily life many years ago. Being a YASTA school, we get the opportunity to showcase our learning and knowledge to others. The YASTA group is going to present in front of around 1000 audience members on 30th of August.



Our YASTA group's topic for this year is "Sounds in culture". We are presenting how Aboriginal people used patterns and science in their music.

We are discussing how Arnhem Land people are the original creators of Yidaki (Didgeridoo) and how they looked for hollow wood for making it. We have learnt that due to knowledge of human anatomy in Aboriginal communities, females were not allowed to play Yidaki because of the belief that it can affect female reproductive organs.

We are also going to talk about how sound waves travel in the form of longitudinal waves and how Aboriginal music follows different patterns. Please keep an eye on our

It's been a very exciting few weeks in the VET world for KPS, with the start of our first short course beginning last week in the Trade Training Centre.


Behind the scenes we have been working on a new Careers Hub project that will see opportunities for Aboriginal students in the north to come together to complete short course offerings hosted by KPS. These courses are designed to support students who struggle to engage with learning to increase their confidence and skills in the VET world, and to help prepare them for larger VET courses that will lead to meaningful career pathways.

The first course we are running is an Introduction to Construction course which began last week and will finish next week. Students from schools across the north including KPS, MOC and Parafield Gardens have come together to learn theory and practical construction skills. They will put these skills to use by working together to build a structure... I wonder what it might be?

Our second course will also be run at KPS and will be Hospitality based. This will run over weeks 9 and 10 this term. In Term 4, we will be hosting a Hair and Barbery introductory course where students will have the opportunity to learn about the industry as well as some basic starter skills. All courses are run by registered training providers and are designed to support students to have positive experiences and build capacity for future engagement in career pathways and programs.

At the beginning of this year, our senior class embarked on their SACE journey. A part of that journey included two challenging subjects: Research Project and Community Studies. Both programs are unique in that they give student the autonomy to choose a topic that interests them.


Fast forward two and a half terms and many of the students have now completed their Community Studies project. Through this process, students learnt how to set achievable goals and follow a plan to reach these goals. Importantly, students were becoming independent learners and developing self-management skills. They will continue to develop these skills as they continue with the Research Project.

The Research Project is like a literacy review that students will complete at university. The subject requires the students to collect primary and secondary resources to answer a question, which they have posed to themselves. The final product will see the students complete a 10 page proposal and two 1500-word papers. KPS senior students are showing perseverance and academic stamina as they seek to deepen their understanding about their chosen topic. A number of students are nearing the completion of their first 1500-word paper and are on track to successfully complete the Research

Project by the end of this academic year.
