Inclusive Education

Inclusive Education is an approach that ensures all students, regardless of their abilities or backgrounds, have equal access to quality education within a supportive and welcoming environment. It focuses on adapting teaching methods and resources to meet the diverse needs of every child, fostering a sense of belonging and community. By valuing diversity and promoting understanding, Inclusive Education helps all students develop important social and academic skills, preparing them for a successful future. One of the roles I lead across the school is Inclusive Education. I work with students, staff, and families to ensure that all learners needs are met with adjustments that ensure that are learning and thriving at school. We support families to access learning assessments and support Allied Health workers to be on site providing therapy to students. I am also a key contact in organising the following:

- Student Review Meetings working with Support Services Staff
- Team Around the Child Meetings
- Site Support Function Meetings
- Applications for funding support IESP
- National Consistent Collection of Disability Data (NCCD)
- Providing professional development opportunities for staff


Across the school, students are continuing with their PAT Adaptive testing. We're incredibly proud of the effort so many of our students are putting in. These assessments help us gain a clearer

allows us to tailor our teaching in a way that supports growth - and it's why we encourage every student to give their best.


We'd also like to take a moment to acknowledge the powerful poetry written by our students during Reconciliation



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Hospitality & Entrepreneurship

After finishing our favourite recipe posters, the Hospitality classes voted on some recipes to cook and have enjoyed sausage curry and fried chicken. Even better than KFC, some said! We have been exploring native foods growing at school or collected on our Sea Country excursion with the hope of inspiring future opportunities in hospitality and entrepreneurship with Kaurna Native Foods. Seablite from Thompson Beach was popular, wetland Ruby Saltbush berries were yummy, and Lerps from our gumtrees were sooo sweet!

Our Sunrise Lime is glowing and the Quandongs look promising for our first Quandong Pie. Catering with Uncle Phil for the recent community breakfast was a winner, including a variety of sausage rolls and delicious scones with lemon myrtle.

Entrepreneurship has been focusing on Aboriginal perspectives on trade and exchange with amazing stories of trading pearl shell jewellery, ochre, and stone tools right across the continent. We explored a question about the rich culture of trading and found a quote from Australians Together saying this still rings true today. It confirms that while some Indigenous entrepreneurs did report the reason for going into business as being about increasing of private wealth – "more than two thirds started their business to benefit their community through offering employment and education opportunities." These perspectives are included to help prepare student groups to create their own small enterprises, with the upcoming \$20 Boss Funded Program, and the exciting First Nations Native Food Innovators Program (two-day incursion next term).







Parachilna (Strzelecki Tk) – Red Ochre Red ochre has great significance to desert cultures, who believe it to be

the blood of ancestral beings. Because of this it is thought to cure, protect and strengthen. Ochre was traded widely from the main ochre quarries. Aboriginal groups travelled from Cloncurry in Queensland to the Yarrakina ochre mine at Parachilna in the Flinders Ranges in South Australi to exchange shields for the special iridescent ochre mined there. Other groups from NSW exchanged light spear shafts for the prized ochre. Aborigines also came from Alice Springs in the Northern Territory, carrying 25 kg blocks of the Yarrakina ochre over distances of 1000 km on

their return journey. The museum has items that were made centuries ago by Aboriginal people and traded around the continent. Now they are using science to get some understanding of, or confirmation of, the trade routes and how those often very sacred items were moved across the Australian continent. The ochre that was very sacred to Aboriginal ceremonies and Aboriginal culture, when it's used on the artefacts leaves a particular kind of geological DNA. Scientists can analyse this information to work out where an object came from.

It's important to have a health check every year, even when you feel well, to stay healthy and strong.

Having a regular health check provides important details to your Doctor to keep you and your family in good health.

All Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people are eligible for an annual health check. 715 health checks are free at Aboriginal Medical Services and bulk billing practices. If you are unsure whether it will be free at your local Doctor, give them a call to ask about the 715 health check before you book.

Participants are required to bring lunch, NSS will provide light refreshments/snacks. We prefer participants to stay with us, but if they choose to go to the Elizabeth Shopping Centre for food (it is a very short walk away) we require permission from the parent/guardian on the registration form.

On the final day we'll have a live performance on the NSS big stage! Doors open at 6pm, the event will run from 6.30pm - 8pm with all family and friends warmly invited. This is always a fantastic event with good vibes galore. We'll have free pizza (easy Friday night dinner!) and a bar open. NSS would love to share this moment with you and your community, so please come along!
